jacques lecoq is the first book to combine an historical introduction to his life and the context in which he worked an analysis of his teaching methods and principles of body work movement creativity and contemporary theatre detailed studies of the work of theatre de complicite and mummenschanz practical exercises demonstrating lecoq's distinctive approach to actor training

an invaluable introduction to the physical in theatre and performance new to this edition a chapter on the body and technology exploring the impact of digital technologies on the portrayal perception and reading of the theatre body spanning from onstage technology to virtual realities and motion capture additional profiles of jerzy grotowski wrights and sites punchdrunk and mike pearson focus on circus and aerial performance new training practices immersive and site specific theatres and the latest developments in neuroscience especially as these impact on the place and role of the spectator

improvisation is a tool for many things performance training rehearsal practice playwriting therapeutic interaction and somatic discovery this book opens up the significance of improvisation across cultures histories and ways of performing our life offering key insights into the what the how and the why of performance it traces the origins of improvisation and its influences both as a social and political phenomenon and its position in performance training including history theory and practice this new edition encompasses theatre and performance studies as well as drama acknowledging the rapid reconfiguration of these fields in recent years its coverage also now extends to improvisation in the usa cinema larping street events and the improvising audience while also looking at improv s relationship to stand up comedy jazz poetry and free movement practices with an index of exercises and an extensive bibliography this book is indispensable to students of improvisation

this volume examines the work of directors jacques copeau theodore komisarjevsky and tyrone guthrie it explores in detail many of the directors key productions including copeau s staging of molière s the tricks of scapin komisarjevsky s signature season of chekhov plays at the barnes theatre and guthrie s pioneering direction of shakespeare s plays in north america this study argues that their work exemplifies the complexity and novelty of the role of theatre directing in the first three quarters of the 20th century as komisarjevsky was in the middle of the genesis of directing in russia copeau launched his directorial career just as the role was gaining definition and guthrie was at the vanguard of directing in britain at last shaking off the traditions of the actor manager to formulate the new role of artistic director

this new study drawing its inspiration from a history of odessa the last italian black sea colony the edwin mellen press 2004 and based on new archival findings focuses on the cultural legacy of the italian founders of this port city shaped by nearly a century of italian presence this new contribution to european cultural history will be of interest to scholars of european italian russian and ukrainian history art historians and musicologists as well as students of migration and multiculturalism

women and puppetry is the first publication dedicated to the study of women in the field of puppetry arts it includes critical articles and personal accounts that interrogate specific historical moments cultural contexts and notions of woman on and off stage part i critical perspective includes historical and contemporary analyses of women s roles in society gender anxiety revealed through the unmarked puppet body and sexual expression within oppressive social contexts part ii local contexts challenges and transformations investigates work of female practitioners within specific cultural contexts to illuminate how women are intervening in traditionally male spaces each chapter in part ii offers brief accounts of specific social histories barriers and gender biases that women have faced and the opportunities afforded female creative leaders to appropriate revive and transform performance traditions and in part iii women practitioners speak contemporary artists reflect on their experiences as female practitioners within the art of puppet theatre representing female writers and practitioners from across the globe women and puppetry offers students and scholars a comprehensive interrogation of the challenges and opportunities that women face in this unique art form
